Through our mission to improve the lives of Council residents by delivering valued and relevant services we stand ready, and open for business, to promptly assist the Northern Territory Government to redress remote housing issues.

our services. We all share in the task of improving the quality of life for





Making a back road better

A much needed upgrade to the back road between Mount Liebig and Haasts Bluff was recently completed by our Technical Services grader operators Ned Wilson and Donovan Spencer. Members of Haasts Bluff Local Authority requested the work on the 100km road, which has been graded and had its original width reinstated.

The road is important because it provides a shorter route between the two communities of Mount Liebig and Haasts Bluff as well as providing access to a number of outstations. It also means that people can still travel between the two communities, even when business is occurring in the Papunya region.

The work cost \$90,000 and was funded by the Commonwealth Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development under the Local Roads Financial Assistance Grant program.




Making cruising around Imanpa, smoother



Driving in and around Imanpa is a little smoother these days after a road grading project finished there recently.






Our pools are open and safe






On a community, pools are not only a great way to cool off and have fun, they also have an important role in ear and skin health, general fitness and school attendance.



Long service in local government recognised



At the Local Government Association of NT (LGANT) conference in Alice Springs, our councillors Lance Abbott (Kintore), Marlene Abbott (Docker River) and Irene Nangala (Kintore) were presented with awards recognising that their service to local government started before the shires.

Organised by LGANT, nominations were open to past and present elected members who have served as councillors for over ten years.

The awards recognise service in local government, acknowledging our councillors eight years service since the shires began and including previous experience serving on their community councils.

Thanks to Marlene Abbott, Irene Nangala and Lance Abbott for all your hard work supporting your communities!

Marlene Abbott (lyarrka Ward) was recognised for over 10 years in local government and has been a member of MacDonnell Regional Council since it began in 2008. Before that, she served her community as an elected member of the Docker River Council Aboriginal Corporation and a Director of the Docker River Store.

Irene Nangala (Luritja / Pintupi Ward) was recognised for over 10 years of service in local government and has served as a Councillor

with MacDonnell Regional Council since it began. She previously served her community as the Chair of the Walungurru Community Council Aboriginal Corporation (soon after it formed in the 1980s) and has worked as an ATSIC Regional Councillor.

Lance Abbott (Luritja / Pintupi Ward) was recognised for 10 years service in local government. He has been twice elected by the Luritja / Pintupi Ward to serve as their representative. Before the formation of the MacDonnell Regional Council, Lance was a councillor for the Walungurru Community Council Aboriginal Corporation.

Earlier this year, at a special reception for our retiring President Sid Anderson, LGANT President Damian Ryan presented him with a LGANT Certificate of Recognition for his 25 years of service to local government.















Over recent years and with extremely limited resources, Nina has been required to implement significant Aged Care sector reforms that were not designed with remote Aboriginal service delivery in mind. Under her care MacDonnell Regional Council became one of the first remote providers in the Northern Territory to be compliant with these reforms, which was no small feat.

We wish her all the best in the future as she returns to the Pacific Islands / Asia seeking to further her experience in international development.



Milpa and Yamba hit the road for trachoma

Milpa the Trachoma Goanna has visited nine communities in the MacDonnell Council region over the past two years. Milpa was joined by friends Yamba the Honeyant and co-host Jacinta Price in roadshows teaching children how to keep clean and avoid the infectious eye disease, Trachoma.

Australia is the only developed country in the world to still have trachoma, which is found in the dry, dusty remote Aboriginal communities of central Australia. Trachoma can be prevented by blowing noses with a tissue and washing children's faces whenever they are dirty. Otherwise trachoma is spread by infected eye and nose secretions (snot) being passed from child to child.
